In 2004 Mr. Frantz reluctantly accepted a plea agreement and was eventually sentenced in July of 2005 to 51 months in the Federal Prison

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Camp (FPC) in Miami, Florida. He spent nearly 16 months there. In 2008, he won his appeal and was released from federal prison on July 18, 2008 after serving nearly 36 months in federal confinement.
