Mit der Festlegung auf diese Vorstellung von Literatur ist auch die Ausrichtung meiner Arbeit bestimmt. Sie wird sich am Erkenntnisinteresse der Psychologie als Wissenschaft orientieren, da diese den gleichen Gegenstand wie die Literatur hat: das innere Erleben und äußere Verhalten des Menschen. Die Literatur hat die Freiheit der Fiktion und kann über menschliches Erleben und Verhalten hinausgehen. In *Spieltrieb* ist dies aber nicht der Fall. Das Interesse am fast identischen Gegenstand ergibt sich für die Literatur und die Psychologie aus folgender Voraussetzung. Die menschliche Existenz spielt sich einerseits im individuellen Erleben einer Eigenwelt ab, einer Welt die bestimmt ist von bewussten und unbewussten Motivationen, Emotionen und Kognitionen. Andererseits bewegen wir uns als Individuen in einer biologischen und sozialen Außenwelt. Zwischen beiden Welten steht der Einzelne in einem Austauschverhältnis.
