irreverent scrutiny." "Much of the talking back comes from marginalized readers: women, like Lillie Wyman, author of *Gertrude of Denmark: An Interpretive Romance*, and other nineteenth-century women critics, or Jewish writers, like Arnold Wesker, whose play *The Merchant* transforms the relationship between Antonio and Shylock. Some talking back comes from an international collection of oppositional voices of the 1960s, including Charles Marowitz, Aime Cesaire, Eugene Ionesco, and Joseph Papp. *Talking Back to Shakespeare* ranges from popular books like the recent Pulitzer Prize-winning novel *A Thousand Acres* by Jane Smiley to obscure, seldom-read ones like Percy MacKaye's ambitious four-play prequel, *The Mystery of Hamlet, King of Denmark*.
