Leo is an Italian writer in his thirties. Thomas, his German lover, is dead. On a plane to Munich, Thomas's home town, Leo slips into a reverie of their meeting and life in Paris, nights in Thomas's flat in Montmartre and a desperate, drug-induced flight through the forests of northern France that spells the end for Leo and Thomas' languid, erotic life together. Leo travels to find anonymity. Structured in three musical movements, *Separate Rooms* is a story of ideal love, broken by absence and separation. When Thomas was alive, he and Leo had separate rooms in order to preserve the urgency of their passion. Now, Leo faces solitude, the impossible striving of memory

to recreate life and the hostility of a prejudiced world. *Separate Rooms*, Tondelli's last book, is a powerful novel of the strength of love and the trauma of death.

Best known for his experimental masterpieces, *Invisible Cities* and *If on a Winter's Night a Traveller*, he was also a brilliant exponent of allegorical fantasy in works such as *The Complete Cosmicomics*. He died in Siena in 1985.

Written between 1963 and 1967, *The Divine Mimesis*, Pasolini's imitation of the early cantos of the *Inferno*, offers a searing critique of Italian society and the intelligentsia of the 1960s. It is also a self-critique by the author of *The Ashes of Gramsci* (1957) who saw the civic world evoked by that book fading absolutely from view. By the mid-1960s, Pasolini theorized, the Italian language had sacrificed its connotative expressiveness for the sake of a denuded technological language of pure communication. In this context, he projects a 'rewrite' of Dante's *Commedia* in which two historical embodiments of Pasolini himself occupy the roles of the pilgrim and guide in their underworld

journey. Densely layered with poetic and philological allusions, and illuminated by a parallel text of photographs that juxtapose the world of the Italian literati to the simple reality of rural Italian life, this narrative was curtailed by Pasolini several years before he sent it to his publisher, a few months prior to his murder in 1975. Yet, many of Pasolini's projects took the provisional form of "Notes toward..." an eventual work, such as *Sopralluoghi in Palestina* (Location Scouting in Palestine), *Appunti per una Oresteide africana* (Notes for an African Oresteia), and *Appunti per un film sull'India* (Notes for a Film on India). The *Divine Mimesis* has a kinship to these filmic works as Pasolini himself ruled it 'complete' though still in a partial form. Written at a turning point in his life when he was wrestling with his poetic 'demons,' the true center of gravity of Pasolini's Dantean project is the potential of poetry to teach and probe, ethically and aesthetically, in reality. "I wanted to make something seething and magmatic," Pasolini declared, "even if in prose." In this first English translation of Pasolini's *La divina mimesis*, Italianist Thomas E. Peterson offers historical, linguistic, and cultural analyses that aim to expand the discourse about an enigmatic author considered by many to be the greatest Italian poet after Montale. Understanding Power Feltrinelli Editore

Published in 2011 by Editions du Seuil, Tarnac, un acte préparatoire interrogates in poetic form the fallout from and precedent for the notorious cause célèbre of the Tarnac Nine--associated with the Invisible Committee, pseudonymous authors of *The Coming Insurrection*. It is his Anglo-American debut full-length, though as editor of the journal *Nioques*, he is well-known to American readers for, among other things, importing to France the work of some more daring poets from the U.S. Gleize's formulations of nudité and littéralité give some sense of his poetics, antithetical to the verse of flourish and ornament, but also to the performance of allusive depth and immanent ambiguity. Directness, detail, and documentation are keywords. In translation, *TARNAC, A PREPARATORY ACT* not only lends insight into radical aesthetic politics that characterize ongoing transatlantic--indeed global--intellectual affinities, but it introduces to American readers an inestimably important figure of French letters. About the

translators: Bonnie Roy is a young scholar and poet specializing in contemporary work; Abigail Lang teaches at the Université Paris-Diderot where she is a scholar of modernist poetry, and a noted translator of English-language poetry into French; Joshua Clover has published two volumes of poetry, *Madonna anno domini* and *The Totality for Kids*. His poems have also appeared three times in *Best American Poetry*, and he has written two books of film and cultural criticism: *The Matrix* and *1989: Bob Dylan Didn't Have This to Sing About*. He teaches at the University of California, Davis. Can we situate an act of political autonomy in/as the provisional autonomy (surfaces) of a poem? // *TARNAC, A PREPARATORY ACT* riffs on/around a 2008 case against Julien Coupat, alleged leader of the Tarnac Nine, a putative 'anarchist' cell, who was accused of 'criminal conspiracy to commit a terrorist act.' // Jean-Marie Gleize considers the implication of an arrest for something 'preparatory,' that is, something like speech. // Can a poem (a preliminary act) be insurrectionary?--Charles Bernstein

Antonio Tabucchi, Italy's premier writer and a best-selling author throughout Europe, draws together Manolo the gypsy, Firmino, a young tabloid journalist with a weakness for Lukacs and Vittorini, and Don Fernando, an overweight lawyer with a professed resemblance to the actor Charles Laughton, to solve a murder that leads far up and down Portugal's social ladder. As the investigation leads deeper into Portugal's power structure, the novel defies expectations, departing from the formulaic twists of a suspense story to consider the moral weight of power and its abuse.

Brother Jacob Pantheon

Considerato perduto, questo straordinario ritratto di Luchino Visconti, steso da Giovanni Testori, è inaspettatamente riemerso. Era stato elaborato nei primi mesi del 1972, dopo "Morte a Venezia" e mentre era in corso la lavorazione di "Ludwig". Di lì a poco una memorabile rottura tra i due con la decisione, dichiarata (ma evidentemente non portata a termine), di distruggere il manoscritto. "Luchino" costituisce un profilo, a più strati, di una delle grandi personalità della cultura del XX secolo, osservata da chi si era trovato in più occasioni a collaborare con lui (dalla sceneggiatura di "Rocco e i suoi fratelli" alle messinscene di "L'Arialda" e "La Monaca di Monza"). Testori fa venire a galla tratti caratteriali, esigenze espressive, modi di vivere e di amare di Visconti, nel tentativo di centrare quella che una volta si sarebbe chiamata la "poetica". Nella strabordante letteratura che riguarda il regista milanese questa voce si staglia per rigore di analisi e lucidità di sintesi. Il libro, che doveva uscire verosimilmente da Feltrinelli nel 1972, è accompagnato da un saggio introduttivo, una postfazione e da note di commento, stese da Giovanni Agosti, che, da un lato, aspirano a chiarire le molteplici allusioni disseminate nel testo e, dall'altro, si pongono come punti di partenza o di verifica per indagini sulle interferenze tra i due autori, Visconti e Testori, e sui loro mondi, contigui ma distanti, con affondi sulle case, le collezioni d'arte, le amicizie... Completano il volume molte immagini inconsuete.

A representative text of a milieu marked by student protests and aspirations for moral and political renewal. First published in Italian in 1968, *The World Saved by Kids* was written in the aftermath of deep personal change and in the context of what Elsa Morante called the "great youth movement exploding against the funereal machinations of the organized contemporary world." Morante believed that it was only the youth who could truly hear her revolutionary call. With the fiftieth anniversary of the tumultuous events of 1968 approaching, there couldn't be a more timely moment for this first English translation of Morante's work to appear.
