Mahalo Ayakari: Sharing and Celebrating Our Okinawa-Hawaii Heritage with Gratitude is a collaborative work that began in 2017 as a brainstorm of projects as the three organizing editors started thinking ahead to 2020 and the 120th anniversary of Okinawans in Hawaii. We met regularly to discuss ideas and the project gradually took shape by early 2018, allowing for an application to Hui O Lailima for its cultural grant. Hence, this project is funded by a generous Hui O Lailima Cultural Grant for 2019. The theme is stated exactly in the title of this collection: sharing and celebrating Okinawan heritage in Hawaii. The volume

contains original works submitted by the people in Hawaii's Okinawan community. This project was a means of *ongaeshi*, repaying a debt of gratitude, by honoring the memories of those who came before us. It was also a means of inviting community engagement to tell the stories of the Okinawan experience in Hawaii. We feel that everyone has a story to tell; when people tell their own stories and speak for themselves, they are empowered. Therefore, it should be told in a manner that best suits the person. When a call for submissions of original works was put out, it was an open one that was not limited to written literary materials, but also included different forms of expression, as we knew that there are people with various kinds of talent in our community. The hope was that people would contribute their talent, what they do best, to leave something for future generations. In this volume, we have written texts as well as fine art submissions of drawings, ceramic arts, quilting, and they all showcase people's creativity/talent in telling our stories of being Uchinanchu in Hawaii. In asking the question, "What does your Uchinanchu heritage mean to you?" we can expect a variety of responses because it is a self-identifying and personal matter, particularly as we are now in a generation of predominantly mixed ethnicities.

Okinawan life, at the crossroads of American militarism and Japanese capitalism, embodies a fundamental contradiction to the myth of the monoethnic state. Suspended in a state of exception, Okinawans have never been officially classified as colonial subjects of the Japanese empire or the United States, nor have they ever been treated as equal citizens of Japan. As a result, they live amid one of the densest concentrations of U.S. military bases in the world. Through close readings of poetry, reportage, film, and memoir on base-town life since 1945, Shimabuku traces a continuing failure to "become Japanese." What she discerns instead is a complex politics surrounding sex work, tipping with volatility along the razor's edge between insurgency and collaboration. At stake in sovereign power's attempt to secure Okinawa as a military fortress was the need to contain a legality itself—that is, a life force irreducible to the legal order. If biopolitics is the state's attempt to monopolize life, then *Alegal* is a story about how borderland actors reclaimed the power of life for themselves.
