To illustrate the difference, with most methods a measure in 3/4 consisting of 4 sixteenth notes followed by 2 quarter notes have the sixteenth notes counted "1e&a" and the quarter notes counted "2, 3" (often leading to students playing the quarter notes as if they were eighth notes). Subdivide and Conquer would have the sixteenth</p>	<p>notes counted "1e&a" and instead have the quarter notes counted "2e&a3e&a," thus using the syllables to measure the lengths of the notes instead of just labeling them.
